Thought for Today

Nicodemus is a distinguished scholar and a leader of his people. He is drawn to, but confused by, the peasant preacher Jesus, who he visits under the cover of darkness. Nicodemus thought he was already part of God's people by being born an Israelite but Jesus tells him that he needs to be 'born from above'. Jesus says that eternal life is not a natural birth right but rather the gift to a people who encounter and are possessed by the generosity of God. This experience of mercy, compassion, love, generosity, and joy sets them free from all regulation and external conformity Nicodemus is challenged; his thinking is governed by the need to follow and uphold laws and regulations.

I think Jesus was telling Nicodemus that the Spirit from above drives us out into the deep, and challenges us to do new things and be a different kind of person. Nicodemus had to let go of certainties and to live by a risky faith.

We don't know how he responded to Jesus' words but he reappears at the end of John's Gospel among those who bury Jesus' body (19.39). Nicodemus seemed to have understood in the end.

The current recommendations from the House of Bishops with regard to the **Coronavirus (COVID-19) are** that we:

- Maintain good hygiene, including priests and servers washing their hands and using alcohol-based hand-sanitiser before Holy Communion.
- Advise against the practice of 'intinction' when the consecrated bread is dipped into the wine - as this could represent an infection transmission route.
- Ensure that adequate supplies of cleaning materials are readily available and that there are procedures for regular cleaning of hard surfaces.
- Ensure that hand hygiene facilities are adequate and working properly; if/when updating or repairing facilities, consider installing automatic or foot-operated taps, dryers and waste bins. Ensure that you have stocks of tissues, paper towels and soaps.
- Consider how you might use hand cleansers, for example at the entrances to rooms or sites without hand-washing facilities.
- Check that you have procedures for isolating (with appropriate supervision) anyone who falls ill within a service.

Although the Government advice is not currently suggesting that churches should suspend the use of the Common Cup, parishioners with coughs and sneezes should certainly be encouraged to receive Communion in one kind only and to refrain from handshaking during the Peace.



Carolyn Rigby writes: For 21 years the Friends of Murambinda Hospital (FMH) have been supporting Murambinda Mission Hospital and the local clinics which supply it. I am a founder member, trustee and treasurer and worked at the hospital myself when a newly qualified GP from 1994-1996.

The hospital serves a population of around 300,000 and provides a full range of medical services- maternity services including Caesarean sections, outpatients and surgery which we called minor: but ranged from bone-setting to skin-grafts and everything else in between. There are in-patient wards too, invariably full, common diseases being TB and malaria, with a very large proportion of the patients being HIV positive or having AIDS related illnesses.

As many of you will know two years ago Robert Mugabe, who had been president since Zimbabwe became independent in 1980, was ousted in a political coup and it was hoped that after many years of mismanagement and economic turmoil that everything would improve.

You may remember that in 2009 Zimbabwe adopted the US dollar after hyperinflation destroyed the value of the Zimbabwe dollar. Those with very good memories will remember the trillion dollar note I brought along in 2008 to show you which then just about bought a loaf of bread. But, because more US dollars were leaving the country - in the form of payments for exports - than coming in, US dollar cash was in short supply. So in 2016, the government introduced bond notes and coins, which were supposed to be worth the same as the US dollar, to make up for the cash shortage but no-one had faith that they were equivalent and bond notes lost value against the dollar. You could still use other foreign currencies to pay for things but exchange rates would cause great confusion and an item would cost a different amount depending on the method used for payment. Time for another solution introduced at the beginning of 2019: a new single currency, the Real Time Gross Settlement (RTGS) dollar, which only existed electronically. This didn't really work though and its value decreased massively from February to October so from November 2019 the Zimbabwe dollar was reintroduced to solve the cash crisis. On 19.1.20, one Zimbabwe Dollar was worth around one third of a US cent! (Or to put it another way you would need 300 Zim dollars to get one US dollar.)

So, unfortunately, no improvement and hyperinflation again. Doctors in the cities have been on strike since September 2019 and most have fled the country to work elsewhere. Those who have stayed have lost all the value of their savings and pensions. Those without any savings are destitute. We have been here before, it is utterly depressing, and the Friends of Murambinda Hospital are needed more than ever.

The weather has also conspired to add to the misery. At the beginning of 2019 Cyclone Idai which devastated Mozambique caused severe flooding and storm damage to the region around Murambinda. Since then as severe drought has hit southern Africa, Victoria Falls was running dry and the water level in Kariba Dam has fallen so low making the hydroelectric power station useless. Prolonged power cuts are the norm.

We often have to make difficult choices when it comes to funding decisions. For many years we have supplemented the salary of all the staff as well as paying the full salary of several key members, but two years ago we stopped paying supplements in order to prioritise medical equipment and pharmacy and hospital maintenance. However, because of the economic situation, two doctors have left and although the other three have never been on strike we feel it is a priority to keep them at Murambinda by supplementing their salaries again. At Christmas we also gave every member of staff a food parcel to ease their hardship a little. Last year we also sent essential medical supplies and paid for essential drugs as well as renovating staff accommodation and tiling the outpatient department and paid for new security gates.

I am visiting the hospital for a week at the end of February 2020 (at my own expense) and am looking forward to telling you more up to date news at the morning service on 15.3.20.

Any help you feel able to give I can ensure you will be well used, and I repeat every penny will go to the Mission as FMH has no employees and the trustees pay all administrative costs ourselves.
